President's Report

This year Sydney Outfielders celebrated its 25th season and to mark that milestone, the Committee strived to go big this season. Several key themes shaped the Committee's decision-making: making the league an even more inclusive and welcoming space; continuing to build the Outfielders community; offering an expanded social calendar; and providing more opportunities to play softball. Other key priorities were to diversify the league's sources of fundraising and to improve the association's governance structures.

Making the league more inclusive and building community

To promote inclusion, in the off-season the Committee resolved to adopt a **new logo** for the association with progress pride flag colours. The purpose of the change was to reflect the true diversity of our membership in the visual shorthand of a logo, and to signal that we are, and aspire to be, a welcoming space for all members of the LGBTQIA+SB community. The launch of our **revamped website** also helped showcase the league's membership and activities to existing players, prospective members and the broader community.

Diversity is a league-wide goal, but it is crucial that it filters down to the team level as well. One way that the league has historically sought to promote diversity within teams is the so-called **gender rules**. These rules have historically been a perennial topic of debate and source of difficulty for teams. In the off-season, the Committee tweaked the rules so that they provide greater flexibility for teams on game days, while still ensuring that teams' composition adequately reflects the diversity of our overall membership. While this change might seem small and tokenistic, it's not – we know that having diverse, balanced teams keeps the door open for people who might otherwise be deterred from joining. The fact that gender rules have essentially become a non-issue this season underscores the success of this rule change.

On the community-building front, the most significant initiative this season was the introduction of the **community points** scheme, which was proposed by a long-standing Outfielders member and adopted by members at last year's AGM. As a new initiative, the scheme was always going to be an experiment this season. From a committee perspective, the rules made it much easier for the Committee to secure volunteers for the range of social and fundraising activities we held this season. Thank you to everyone who volunteered this season – it was gratifying to see so many different people show up and help out.

Expanding the social calendar

While the Social Report provides a thorough overview of the social activities held this season, there are a few I want to highlight.

The first major event during this Committee's term was the **Pride Month Double Header**. In mid-June, we held an **Open Day** at Alexandria Park. While it rained before and during set up, the weather fortunately cleared just as the event kicked off. Over 60 people attended this event, with an even split of existing members and fresh faces. Two weeks later we held **Drag Bingo** at the Imperial Erskineville, hosted by Coco Jumbo. We had over 120 people come

along and raised about \$4,000. The sense of fun and frivolity at the event was palpable and it was definitely one of the highlights of the season.

The league also put on **Open Days in September and in February**. Like the Pride Month Open Day, these two events have become annual fixtures, providing a great opportunity for existing members to participate in softball activities outside of the regular season and for prospective new players to learn about the league.

Another highlight of the social calendar this season was the annual **Christmas Party**, which took place this year at Universal. This was another well-attended event, with about half of the league's membership coming along. There was a drag performance by friend of the league Coco Jumbo and lots of shenanigans from members. A really enjoyable night.

Last, but not least, were our events during **Mardi Gras** season. We made a statement at **Fair Day** with a visually striking neon stall, which has been nominated for a Mardi Gras 2026 Community Award. Congratulations to Josh and the Mardi Gras Subcommittee on the recognition – you all did incredible work. Huge thanks and kudos are also due to Joshua and the Subcommittee for putting together an amazing float for the league's 3rd year in the **Mardi Gras Parade**. Thanks also to the many members who marched this year – you did us all proud.

Maximising opportunities to play softball

At the end of last season, the Committee conducted a survey. A consistent theme was that members wanted maximum playing time and minimal disruptions and byes. To address this feedback, a key initiative this season was to trial **Alexandria Park Oval** as an additional playing location, to supplement our ongoing seasonal bookings at Centennial Parklands. While feedback about this location has been mixed, members have overwhelmingly indicated that they prefer to play at an offsite location over having a bye. With Centennial Parklands offering no room for our league to grow, future committees will need to continue to explore field hire and scheduling options at Alexandria and other inner city locations, to ensure the league is able to meet demand.

Having the additional bookings at Alexandria Oval meant we were also able to trial **Friday night league-wide training sessions**. These sessions were generally well-received and provided an opportunity for players from different teams to practise their skills and socialise in a relaxed and friendly setting. The next committee may wish to consider scheduling these sessions more frequently in the first half of the season and focusing on particular skills, so that members can get the most out of the sessions.

We **reorganised the draw** this season to make the most of our field bookings. This included making use of the fields in weeks when we didn't have enough fields to run a full round: in the opening round, where teams got to start their season with a relaxed S20 competition against other teams; a split Round 7 in the two weeks before the Christmas break; and the A League of Our Own event in January. The finals draw too was designed to get around some unevenness in our field bookings towards the end of the season.

Finally, to ensure that captains and players could keep their focus on the game, we organised **umpires** for all of the grand final games. Thanks again to the members who volunteered their time to help the finals run smoothly.

Improving league governance

Behind the scenes, the Committee did a large amount of compliance work to ensure that the association is up to date with its legal, regulatory, contractual and financial reporting obligations. Among other things, this involved some policy writing and the completion of two years' worth of not-for-profit self-review tax returns. This foundational work will continue to benefit the league going forward.

Season overview

League membership held steady this year, with 200 players and 12 returning teams participating this season. About 70 (or over one-third) of our members this season were new players.

Despite the significant amount of rainfall Sydney received this summer, somehow we managed to get through the season without having to cancel a single round. The weather gods must be fans of slow pitch softball.

On the field, **Ball Breakers** were crowned season champions, finishing at the top of the ladder after the round robin series and winning the grand final. Their victory marked the end of the Comets' incredible 12-season winning streak.

Galahs had a great season, finishing 2nd overall and showcasing some of the strongest batting in the league. It was also encouraging to see the team deepen their involvement in league activities, with many Galahs members stepping up to volunteer at events throughout the year.

Having long been the team to beat, **Comets** once again played a pivotal role in setting a high standard of play across the league. Their 3rd place finish reflects both the depth of competition this season and the long-standing contribution they have made to lifting the overall quality of the competition.

Base Invaders had their best result to date, finishing 4th in the competition in the team's third season playing together. With four new players joining the team, the Base Invaders built on last year's fifth-place finish through consistent performances and strong cohesion.

BDE approached the season with strong spirit and teamwork, finishing 5th overall but with the best defensive record in the league. BDE have shown an impressive degree of sporting prowess since joining the league last season.

Fireballs maintained their relaxed and friendly presence on the field, finishing the season in a commendable 6th place. The Fireballs are a team that exemplifies the welcoming and fun atmosphere that defines the league.

With a number of new players joining the fold, the **Oddballs** had a steady season, finishing in the middle of the ladder in 7th place. The Oddballs seem to have the biggest fan club in the league, with friends and family members often being spotted on the sidelines of their games.

Pitch Please! had a stellar second season, improving on last year's record to finish 8th overall. The team managed to keep their losses to tight margins and had a couple of thumping wins, ending the round robin series with a run differential of -3. I'm sure they'll be aiming to reach even greater heights next season.

Phoenix Flyers finished their season just like their namesake, rising from a patchy round robin to take out top honours in the Heels Division and come in at 9th overall. Another friendly and laid-back team, they seem unassuming until they step up to the plate or pull off huge plays on the field!

Although there was no space in the league for a new team this season, one team – **Pickles** – opened its roster to a large number of new players. Pickles quickly became a valued part of the league, bringing enthusiasm, community involvement, and steady skill development throughout the season. Congratulations on a fantastic first season together, Pickles!

Barebatters had a tough round robin series, failing to win a single game. But they managed to lift when it counted the most, eking out wins during the semi-finals and in their grand final. Those late results should give the team a good foundation for next season.

Finally, **Ohana** brought their experience and spirit to games and they're always a pleasure to play against. After a tough 2024-2025 season, Ohana started this season off flying, winning their first three games of the competition. While the team wasn't able to continue on that trajectory for the rest of the season, they should take encouragement from the fact that they held their own against increasingly strong opponents. All the best next season, Ohana!

Financial Report

All in, a snapshot of our finances for this year's season:

- Income from membership fees: \$23,441
- Cash received from fundraising efforts \$23,303 of which \$7545 was generated from the raffle
- New equipment purchased: \$1579
- End of year surplus: \$8,385
- End of year net assets: \$41,196

Throughout the 2025/26 season, the league continued to prioritise accessibility, participation, and player development. Financial decisions were guided by a commitment to ensuring all members had access to appropriate equipment, skill development opportunities, and an enjoyable game-day experience.

This included investment in new equipment, additional training opportunities, extra field hire for more games and the introduction of a raffle initiative to support fundraising and community engagement.

This season saw three key events provide opportunities for fundraising and member participation. We started the year with

Pride Month and a sold out drag bingo event at The Imperial, generating revenue from ticket sales and a raffle. The Bunnings sausage sizzle followed and resulted in our highest fundraising amount of the season, this was aided by the Give Out Day contributions.

We ended the season with our Neon Slayground march at Mardi Gras which required no league contributions due to all the fundraising efforts, in particular the raffle. This resulted in the league being able to refund some of the entry fee for members.

In addition this year we changed the level of cover we had for our insurance, now adding accident cover to pay towards the cost of injury treatment and income loss as a result of being unable to work. The level of cover we received was quite low so I will be recommending to the next committee to consider increasing this.

Thanks to our healthy surplus and to celebrate a jam packed season we will be supporting the AGM with a larger budget than last year so we hope you are all having a great afternoon!

Social Report

From the very beginning, the goal this year was to **lean fully into who we are as a league**: not just a place to play softball, but a place to belong. We delivered the most packed social calendar we've ever had — more events, more variety, more opportunities for people to connect — and the response from members was incredible. Attendance was consistently high, energy never dipped, and the sense of community across the league felt stronger than ever.

None of this happens by accident. It took an enormous number of volunteers, committee members, and community champions to bring this calendar to life. From early morning setups to late-night pack downs, selling raffle tickets, running BBQs, hosting events, coordinating venues, and everything in between — this season was powered by a collective effort across the entire league. The willingness of members to step up and contribute is something we should all be incredibly proud of.

At its core, our social program exists for a reason. For many of us, traditional sporting environments haven't always felt safe, inclusive, or welcoming. What we've built here is something different. A space where people can engage however they want — whether that's playing competitively, coming along for a drink, or just finding their people. The social side of the league is where those connections are formed. It's where new members are welcomed, where friendships grow quickly, and where the barriers that can exist in sport disappear. That balance of **community first, sport second** is what makes this league so special, and this year we saw that play out in full.

We were incredibly fortunate this season to have such strong support from our venues and partners. A huge thank you to **Universal Sydney** for hosting our Christmas party, **The Bat & Ball Hotel** for being a constant home for us across the season and supporting our raffles, **Watsons EQ** for hosting us after games each week, **The Imperial** for making Drag Bingo such a standout event, and **Sauna X** for backing our early season activations and allowing us to fundraise in-house. These partnerships are vital — they don't just give us places to gather, they actively enable the social fabric of the league to thrive.

To make our events accessible to as many people as possible, we leaned heavily into fundraising throughout the season. Raffles, lucky spins, sausage sizzles — all working to keep ticket prices low while still delivering high-quality events. Across Pride Month alone, we had over **\$12,500 worth of prizes** in circulation, which speaks to the scale and ambition of what we delivered this year.

Pride Month was a standout and set the tone for everything that followed. The **Pride Month Open Day** welcomed over 60 attendees despite a rainy start, with a full rainbow appearing over the fields just before we kicked off — a pretty perfect moment. Skill stations, mini games, and a relaxed, welcoming atmosphere made it a huge success. Two weeks later, **Drag Bingo at The Imperial** brought over 120 people together and raised \$4,000 for the league — one of our biggest single-event fundraisers to date.

Our **September Open Day** continued that momentum, again drawing over 60 attendees and converting more than 30 new members on the day registrations opened. The follow-on social

at the Newmarket Hotel, with pizza provided by the venue, was a perfect example of how we integrate new members straight into the community — no awkward transition, just immediate connection.

The **Bunnings Sausage Sizzle** was our first major fundraiser of the season and a true test of our organisation (and resilience). Despite two failed gas bottles, we pushed through and nearly sold out. With volunteers from 11 of 12 teams, it was also one of our strongest community-wide efforts and set the tone for the season ahead — including the launch of our community points system.

Our **Season Opening Party at Bar Cleveland** brought over 100 members together and marked the official start of the season. It was the first opportunity for many new players to meet their teammates, and within hours the league dynamic was already forming — helped along by a DJ set from Red Bull and some very competitive pool downstairs once the formalities wrapped up.

We also introduced **Friday Night Training Sessions**, which added a new layer to the league. These sessions gave players a chance to build confidence and skills in a relaxed environment, while still keeping things social with post-training dinners and drinks. It's something we'll look to build on further next season.

The **Christmas Party at Universal** was another highlight — over 100 attendees, great food, high energy, and Coco Jumbo delivering iconic festive performances. It also marked the launch of our Mardi Gras theme and opened registrations for what would become one of our biggest campaigns yet.

Mid-season, we took a step back with **A League of Their Own**, blending a mixed-team social game with a moment to reflect on the history and purpose of our league. It was a reminder of why spaces like this matter — and how far we've come.

The **Bat & Ball Long Weekend Social** and ongoing raffles kept engagement high throughout the season, while **Fair Day** once again proved to be one of our most important community-facing events. Despite challenging weather, our volunteers showed up in force, merchandise sales were strong, and we connected with a huge number of potential new members.

Our Mardi Gras lead-in event, **Let's Slay Ball!**, brought together over 30 participants on a scorching day, followed by another successful raffle at the Bat & Ball. These smaller, more casual events are just as important — they keep the momentum going and continue to build connections across the league.

And then, of course, **Mardi Gras**.

After months of planning, rehearsals, logistics, and a lot of glitter, we brought **Neon Slayground** to Oxford Street. Over 50 members marched in custom neon kits, dancing our way through the parade with energy that was impossible to ignore. We were loud, proud, and completely unmissable. The effort that went into choreography, costumes, float build, and coordination was enormous — and it paid off. It was one of the defining moments of the season, and something the entire league should be proud of.

A huge thank you to everyone who volunteered across the season — at events, fundraisers, open days, and game days. Special recognition also goes to the **Mardi Gras subcommittee**, who dedicated countless hours to delivering such a successful campaign.

On a personal note, it's been an absolute privilege to take on the Social Officer role this season. Seeing the league show up for each other, support one another, and genuinely enjoy being part of this community has been incredibly rewarding.

Looking ahead, there's so much potential to build on this momentum — bigger events, new ideas, and even more opportunities to bring people together.

To everyone who came along, volunteered, bought a raffle ticket, or simply brought good energy — thank you.

This league is what it is because of you. Community first. Sport second. Always.

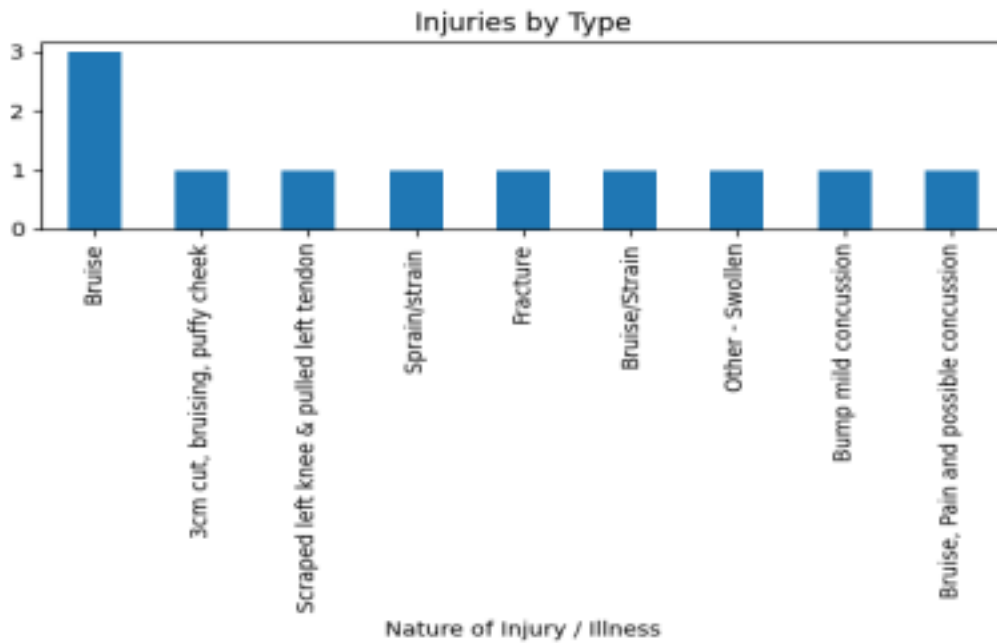
Safety Officer Report

Softball Injury & Incident Report 2025–2026

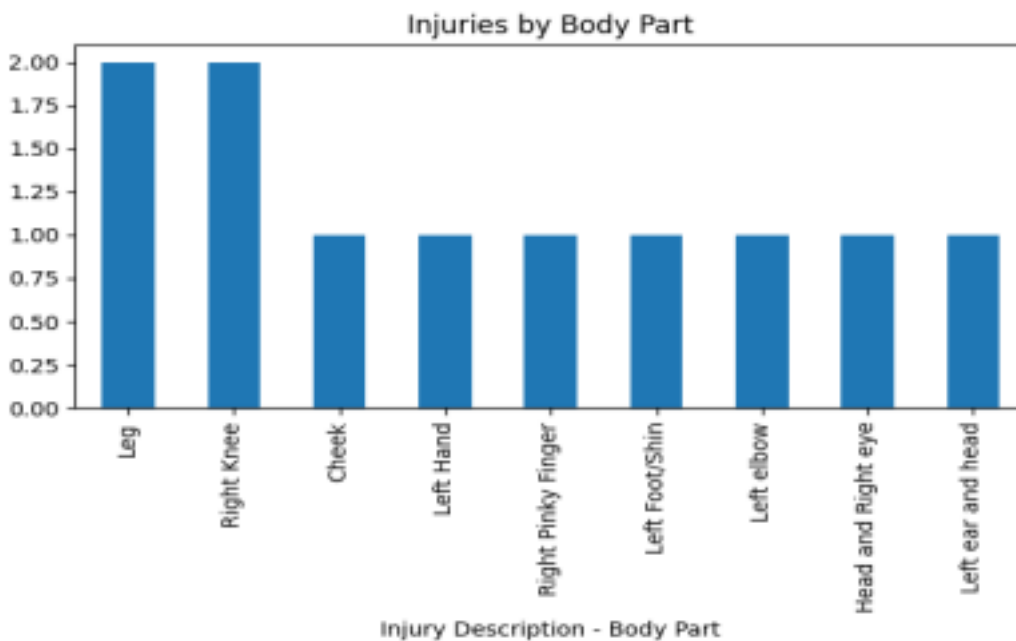
This report provides an overview and analysis of injuries recorded during the 2025–2026 softball season. The aim is to identify patterns, assess risk areas, and recommend strategies to improve player safety.

Total Incidents Recorded: 30

Injuries by Type



Injuries by Body Part



Key Findings

Injuries occurred consistently throughout the season. Most injuries were minor, including bruising and cuts, with some moderate injuries such as sprains and strains. Common causes included ball impact, collisions between players, and sudden movements such as twisting or overreaching.

Risk Areas

Lower body injuries were most common, particularly affecting knees and legs. Hand and finger injuries were also frequent due to catching and fielding activities. Contact-related incidents highlight the need for improved on-field awareness.

Recommendations

- Structured warm-ups and conditioning programs
- Strength and flexibility training focusing on lower body
- Improved catching and fielding techniques
- Monitoring fatigue and ensuring recovery
- Regular inspection of playing surfaces

Conclusion

While most injuries were minor, recurring patterns indicate opportunities to improve safety through training, conditioning, and awareness. Implementing these strategies should reduce injury rates in future seasons.
